Duang Tengtrirat





It's been a busy month with the new committee members settling in to their responsibilities. Our members now total 402, so our growth is steady and I'd like to welcome the new members of this vibrant and friendly U3A community.

Since becoming president I've had a number of meetings and some excellent results. A meeting with the council's positive ageing officer, Andrea Consentino, has meant that the Eltham Courthouse is being given a sustainability makeover and so soon the power of the heater won't be negated by freezing draughts from ill-fitting doors and other gaps. Andrea has also promised more publicity via council publications and we're working on signage and a bike rack for the Courthouse. The council has made much new accommodation available to U3A if we can use it and so we may be soon be running courses at North Warrandyte and other Nillumbik venues.



My first president's briefing at U3A network was informative and useful in terms of finding out how other U3As are managing their resources and problems. Our treasurer, Ian Richards and I met Melanie Holt and Adrian Cully from Nillumbik Shire and were successful in ensuring that our funding is secure for the coming year. On May 20, Nillumbik U3A hosted the Northern Metro Region meeting and, with representatives from Moreland, Banyule, Whittlesea, Hume, Yarra City, Wallan and district, Darebin and U3A Network, this was another very useful engagement. After reports from each individual U3A we discussed topics such as: support from local councils; partnership with other community groups; recruitment of tutors and committee members and the tutor bank being set up by U3A Network. Our new catering officer, Deb Thomson, prepared a healthy and scrumptious lunch, Maureen Meaney took the minutes, Stuart Winstanley and Ian Richards attended, and it was a great day. John Baird, of the marketing sub-committee, has been working on a bookmark to publicise U3A, Bill Naim has been organising forums and film nights, Stuart Winstanley has been putting together the list of courses for Term 3 for the Eltham venues and the new timetable will be available

MEET A TUTOR

Robert Scopes



Robert is another in our band of volunteers who not only joined our U3A very early in its creation, but has involved himself in almost every aspect of the organisation since then.

Robert was born in South London. His secondary education took place at St. Dunstan's College, Catford, South London, where he studied Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry in his final year. Robert's tertiary education took place at Cambridge University, where he completed a BA and PhD. Since graduating he has worked in the following institutions:

- Agricultural Research Council, UK, at both Cambridge and Bristol.(1961-64; 1967-72)
- CSIRO, at North Ryde, Sydney.(1964-67)
- La Trobe University.(1972-1999) He was appointed Professor of Biochemistry in 1992.

Robert retired from La Trobe University in 1999. During his working life he had published over 150 scientific papers. In 1983 Robert published the 1st edition of Protein Purification: Principles and Practice (Springer Advanced Texts in Chemistry); the 3rd edition (1993) is still selling well. It has been translated into both Russian and Japanese.

His marriage to Eve in 1965 led to the birth of their two daughters, Jocelyn in 1966 and Clare in 1967. Both are graduates of La Trobe.

Robert joined our U3A in 2009, the year we started our own courses in Hurstbridge. He has tutored each year since then in many science related subjects. He has also contributed regularly to the Music Tutti course and assisted his wife Eve in the organisation of many social functions such as concerts and quiz nights. Robert has also curated an art exhibition at Bridges. His participation in courses such as Economics, Literature and Art History and the Discussion Group is indicative of his broad range of interests. In addition to his many contributions to Nillumbik U3A classes, Robert has served on our Committee for four years and was Treasurer for three of those.

In his spare time listening to classical music and painting in acrylics and oils remain Robert's passions.

A SUCCESSFUL SHORT COURSE

The Middle East – the cradle of civilisation, the Holy Land, colonisation, oil and wars. The Middle East features large on the news but most of us know little about the people, their lands, culture, traditions and history. The Nillumbik U3A course – *The Middle East and Iran* gave class participants a short glimpse of the complexity of the Middle East and showed that simplistic slogans cannot illuminate the issues that are highlighted in the media on an almost daily basis.

Barbara Jackson and Cathy Guinness co-facilitated the six week Middle East and Iran course held during second semester. Twenty four participants joined this very popular course which featured guest speakers and subject tutors. Maree Papworth and Hamid Amirsardari gave insight into Iran and the Gulf States as they spoke about their life stories. Tutors Lobat Salemi introduced the class to Persian history while Alex Hurcombe drew the vast canvas of the middle east together by providing an excellent overview of how the interplay of colonialism and global politics has shaped, and is still shaping, the Middle East.

FOOD TALE - *A Foraging Expedition*

Recently I visited my sister in Tasmania and despite the steady rain and icy winds we set out to do some foraging along a disused railway track. The elderberries and blackberries were already long gone and the mushrooms we found were too waterlogged to be worth picking. However, we managed to get some plump rosehips which would eventually be made into a tasty jam. The highlight though was finding a small apple tree heavily laden with perfect rosy and gold fruit. Birds had already sampled some of the apples and the ones that had fallen on the ground provided a feast for worms and other creatures. But there was plenty for everyone and my sister and I picked a couple of bags full and returned home happy albeit with thoroughly sodden clothing.



Amongst my strongest childhood memories are the many happy hours spent food-gathering with my mother and sister when we lived in the Black Forest in Germany. Forest, field, roadside verges and hedgerows all yielded an abundance of edible and medicinal treasures - mushrooms, berries, leaves, flowers and roots – which, under Mama's guidance, we gathered to supplement our otherwise meagre meals. FABULOUS OPPORTUNITY


Armchair Theatre' gives people a fabulous opportunity to discover the best and most popular playwrights. I believe it is a riveting course designed to enhance a love of literature through group readings.

We will look at works that have helped to define our sense of identity: 'Don's Party', 'The Club', 'Gallipoli', 'The Removalists', 'Hotel Sorrento', 'Brilliant Lies', to mention but a few. Choice of scripts will be based on consensus decision-making and I will be a facilitator, not an autocrat. I have a great love of literature based on a teaching career spanning thirty-eight years and I can assure you that you will be exposed to the very best plays available. Classes will read the plays and discuss issues wherever they may take us. Reading our plays can create a strong sense of 'ownership' and class members will enjoy hearing a play performed out loud. Class members will find the sessions stimulating and memorable but there will be no coercion or pressure to read - everyone can take what they will from the sessions. My experience is however of groups who enthusiastically take on their favourite "characters" and really get involved.

Nilumbik Reconciliation Group (NRG) proposed course for Term 4.



In Term 4 the Nilumbik Reconciliation Group (NRG) is planning a series of discussions with Aboriginal leaders. The 6 week course of weekly discussions will cover a range of topics: Wurundjeri culture-from the past to the vibrancy of present day cultural practices; the importance of Aboriginal languages; insights and discussions on the shared history of white settlement and aboriginal interaction; Recognition Movement and Constitutional change; The case for a Treaty; National Identity and Indigenous Rights. All sessions will be led by an Aboriginal leader and will be held each Thursday night, 7:30 to 9:00pm at Edendale Farm, Eltham. At the end of the 6 weeks an optional bus trip to Aboriginal sites in the Yarra Valley with a Wurundjeri Elder, will be offered.
