U3A Nillumbik "The Beginning"

It all started in Hurstbridge. I was on the management committee of the Community Centre there and we were floating ideas on how to boost our user base at the Centre. suggestion to establish a U3A was met with approval and, although I had hoped somebody else would take this on, I ended up calling a public meeting in June 2008 to explore the idea further. About 45 attended which suggested an interest in a local U3A, and a small group of volunteers got together to form a steering committee.

In Term 4 of that year, under the auspices of Whittlesea U3A, we ran four courses at the Hurstbridge Community Centre — Understanding Economics, Play Reading, Current Affairs Discussion and a Writers group.

Urged on by the U3A Network to become an independent organisation, and with valuable support and advice from Whittlesea U3A, the committee put in an enormous amount of work - writing a constitution, becoming incorporated, liaising with other U3As, applying for grants, organising a bank account and PO box, planning courses, equipping an office, recruiting members and publicising our venture.

U3A Nillumbik was officially launched in November 2008. I became member No.1 and its inaugural president ably supported by a committee of six other members -Laraine Hussey (Secretary), Suzanne Hay (Treasurer), Colleen Gardner (Catering), Jill Holmes (Film Society), Donna Kilgour (Public officer and Grants) and John O'Connor (Cosmology Tutor). Brian Mclean and Doug Rutherford also came on board soon after our inauguration.

Right from the beginning our vision was for a U3A which included the entire Shire, so we decided on the name — Nillumbik U3A. Our plan was also to liaise with as many community groups and organisations, including the Local Council, as possible.

I was on a mission! None of my friends, acquaintances or even total strangers was exempt from my determined arm-twisting as I encouraged them to become a tutor or speaker and join as a member.

By the beginning of Term 1, 2009, under our own banner, we were ready to roll with 16 courses and activities in place. These included Astronomy Cosmology (John Understanding O'Connor), Èconomics (John Besley), Art History (Frank Hekes), Share a Short Story (Barbara Canterford), Spanish (Vincent Schultz), French (Bill Naim). Jenneke Bateman ran a writing Group and Frances Meikeljohn had us tootling away on recorders. I set up Mind Games and Brain Gym, Discovering the District, Be a Tourist in our Town, and, in conjunction with Jill Holmes, started Soapbox - Issues and Current Affairs. Some of these courses are still running under the direction of new and enthusiastic tutors.

Then a devastating event occurred which truly tested the mettle of our newly formed U3A, making us one of a few, if not

the only, U3A began that with a 'trial by fire'.

While teaching at Broadford Secondary College in 1983 I chaired the local Council Committee that addressed entering the first *Keep Australia Beautiful Tidiest Town*. In this State wide 'competition' we defeated 100 towns on a wide range of criteria. We won outright in all categories and all divisions.

My community involvement continued throughout my teaching career. In the '90's I was Principal of Nauru Primary School and Deputy Principal of Nauru Secondary College. Nauru is a harsh, oppressive environment for anyone to work in. I care for the Nauruans and am saddened by the oppressive corruption that has destroyed the Nauruan inhabitant's spirit.

I appeared on a *Four Corners* program which conducted an exposé of this forlorn little nation. I would relish the opportunity to talk about my time in Nauru.

My love for drama and the theatre has been with me since my earliest days. When teaching in Broadford I directed Slaughter in Suburbia, Brigadoon and a number of other productions. When I moved to Yarrawonga I directed C. J. Denis's Songs of the Sentimental Bloke. When I was not directly involved in a production I assumed the mantle of 'guest critic' which led to a postgraduate Diploma of Freelance Journalism.

I love teaching and regard it as a privilege to still be involved. I hope my tutoring repays the opportunity U3A has afforded me. If it wasn't for U3A my life would not be as enriched as it is. Surely U3A is the vehicle that gives its members a real reason for getting out of bed in the morning — this is a time for moments of intellectual stimulation in social settings that thrive on friendships and shared interests. U3A fulfils a valuable purpose in our lives.

Shakespeare ROCKS

"The Play's the Thing ..."

On Saturday 14 May 2016, we mere players who are members of Noel Butterfield's course Armchair Theatre (and/or Shakespeare Rocks) attended Heidelberg Theatre's outstanding production of Reginald Rose's classic play Twelve Angry Men - a play read, discussed and admired by the Armchair Theatre group.

Director, Chris Baldock, invited 22 members of the audience to further immerse themselves in the play and enjoy theatre in-the-round, seated on-stage at the rear, and to the sides of the main stage. Added to our sense of involvement was the use of HTC's revolve - the revolving central section of the stage.

It is America in the late fifties. The three day trial of a young coloured man accused of murdering his father has just concluded. Twelve white, mostly middle-class jurors are locked in the jury room on a stiflingly hot day to consider their verdict. It must be unanimous. If they find the accused guilty, the death penalty is mandatory.

Eleven of the 12 jurors, some of them distracted by their own prejudices and concerns, are reluctant to analyse the evidence. One man, Juror Number Eight, a quiet, thoughtful man seeks the truth. He is strong and compassionate with the courage to stand alone to ensure each piece of evidence is examined.

Class Feedback He asks if there is reasonable doubt about the young man's guilt. The task of the jurors is grave. The decision of whether a young man lives or dies rests with them.

The jurors' personalities are revealed. Bigotry, racism, class conflict, sadism, timidity and indifference affect some. Logical argument eventually results in rational thought. The themes of the play remain pertinent and will continue to resonate as our contemporary society faces the same prejudices, human frailties and social tensions.

The performances of the fine cast were memorable, each character portrayed convincingly and at times poignantly. Suspense was maintained, leaving the audience with much to remember and ponder.

Plays enjoyed this year in *Armchair Theatre* include Shaw's *Pygmalion*, Willy Russell's *Educating Rita*, Arthur Miller's *Death of a Salesman* and *Ned Kelly* by Douglas Stewart. *Death of a Salesman* is my personal favourite of all these fine offerings. We read and interpret the plays, may not always agree with the interpretations of others, but always learn a little more about the play, ourselves and fellow students in the process.

In Shakespeare Rocks we have been spellbound and blood-spattered by Macbeth, revelled and laughed at The Taming of the Shrew and are currently suffering with King Lear. We have also watched some fine films of all these Shakespeare classics. At the end of each class I remind myself – "The Play's the Thing".

Tutor Profile Carole Waldron

Aeschylus Oresteia

"... an exploration of the relationship between mankind and its Gods."

Like so many of us at U3A, I have always been interested in education. Early family influences and some wonderful teachers engendered in me a lifelong interest in enquiry and learning.

My early years were spent in Melbourne and I studied at Melbourne University (where I met my husband). I lived in Tasmania for two years and then, from 1972 to 1981, in Papua New Guinea.

Although I had trained as a Secondary Teacher I was lucky enough to gain a Primary Teaching position in an International School in PNG. Teaching at Gordon School International some truly gifted and creative teachers from at least five different countries provided opportunities and learner/ teacher experiences which were lasting and inspirational.

After I retired, I enrolled in CAE Classical Studies classes and began Latin Classes at U3A. As Retirees we are well positioned to develop new or lapsed skills and explore new areas of enquiry.

I have found U3A to be wonderful forum as the informal and friendly environment enables us to cooperatively engage in areas of interest that, I believe, are less rewarding if pursued as sole enquiry.

Two years ago I joined Lyn Studies Hatherly's Greek group. It was wonderful class and I was so grateful to be in a group that was led by such delightful, friendly and inspiring teacher. When, sadly, Lyn was unable to continue, she asked me to fill the role of facilitator in her absence. She suggested that having read The Iliad and The Odyssey we might like to The revisit Agamemnon which, as well as being a great achievement in its own right, may be viewed as a sequel to Homer.

So thanks to Lyn we now have a new group: The Oresteia.

Aeschylus's Oresteia artistically brilliant, compelling and very moving. Through the dramatisation of individual relationships and fateful family curses, it leads into an exploration of the relationship between mankind and its Gods, and hence with its associated themes of fate and freewill, glory, death, loyalty and betrayal and especially overweening Pride and its consequences.

As we experience the dramatic transition, through suffering, from a society underpinned by brutality and revenge to one that is grounded in justice and democracy, I become more and more certain that any real understanding of the present is founded on a broad comprehension of the past.

I feel privileged to work with this U3A class as we explore this challenging Drama. Each week we grapple with its complexities and I find it a thoroughly rewarding process.

In future classes I would like to study other extant early literature and then move on to later significant works which have provided the building blocks for Western Civilisation.

Hopefully these proposed classes will provide us with a better understanding of Melbourne City Council's motto, "Vires acquirit eundo" translated as We gather strength as we go.



Myanmar in Transition to Democracy: What are the potentials for significant change?

Following 50 years of military dictatorship Burma, or Myanmar as it is now called, is in transition.

The elections of November last year heralded change with the NLD party of Aung San Suu Kyi achieving a resounding majority. However, there remain many legacies from the past and many issues remain, eg poverty, neglected health and education services, human rights abuses, continuing land confiscation, violence and the exclusion of some ethnic and religious minorities.

However, there has been a remarkable and mostly peaceful transition to democracy accompanied by a rapid growth in civil society organisation. Volunteers, including many young people, are tackling a wide range of issues and responding to people's social welfare needs. The youth movement holds out promise in this time of transition.

Presenter: Jill Jameson

Jill Jameson has worked with people from Myanmar since the early 1990s ranging from managing projects for the International Women's Development Agency on the Thai-Burma border to offering training in peace buildina and conflict transformation workshops in Burma/ Myanmar over the last 15 years. She has worked with local community organisations, inter-faith groups, recently released political prisoners and monks. She also works with refugees such Karen communities from Burma in Melbourne at the Foundation for Survivors Torture, facilitating peace buildina training skills to strengthen and communities.

Jill's involvement in refugee situations has included managing CAA/ Oxfam primary health care and community development programs in Sudan for Ethiopian and Eritrean refugees, and work with the Government-in-exile of Tibet on a Plan for the future of Tibet.

Jill is on the Advisory Committee of the International Network of Engaged Buddhists, and represented INEB through a small Buddhist delegation to Burma in November 2007, to 'Bear Witness to the Suffering in Burma' after the Saffron revolution.

She discovered that it is possible to make this journey without the need to carry a heavy backpack, sleep in crowded dormitories and arrive footsore. She became a passionate advocate of supported Camino walking, encouraging people in a similar and even more mature age group to believe that they are not 'too old' to join in this amazing experience.

During the last 5 years, Diane has walked over 2,000kms along several lessertravelled Camino trails in Portugal and Spain.
