Our Trial By Fire

The second instalment ...

Sabi Buehler continues her story of U3A Nillumbik's early years.

On Saturday, 7 February 2009, the Black Saturday bushfires ravaged areas of our community. Just about everyone was affected – directly or indirectly. One potential tutor lost his life and two others their homes, many members also lost property and friends and family.

Nevertheless, on Monday morning, February 9th, we ran our programme as planned. Where tutors were unable to run their classes during the first week or two, I and others initially ran them as best we could. Although the fires and their aftermath were never far from our minds, we offered the opportunity to focus on other matters for a while. This was a brief but necessary respite for many of our members.

Not only did the fires create the need for support and solace to our members required extra meetings communications with bushfire recovery organisations to pass on information. Some committee members and tutors helped with bushfire relief work. Some other U3As wanted to show their solidarity and support - Dandenong U3A knitted beanies and scarves for distribution to our members, U3A Online, based in Queensland, offered us four courses free to our members and Foster Toncurry U3A in NSW offered free accommodation to our members who might want to get away for a while. This all required a lot of extra time and work.

At a ceremony to acknowledge the efforts by various individuals and groups in providing bushfire relief and support, the State Member, Danielle Green, presented Nillumbik U3A a framed Certificate of Appreciation.

Nillumbik U3A, in its first year, managed to offer 25 courses and activities – some were one-offs, others continuing. We held monthly film nights and an Open House at the end of each term and invited non-members to attend – partly to spread the word about U3A but also to recruit new members.

Thanks to the support of the Hurstbridge Community Centre management committee, who offered us very reasonable rental fee and office space, we ran the majority of our activities at the Hurstbridge Community Centre (now called *The Hub*). However we also ran as many courses as possible in other locations throughout the Shire including Eltham (French), Kangaroo Ground and Diamond Creek although usually the rent was considerably higher.

Despite, or maybe because of, our traumatic beginnings, by the end of the year our membership had reached 132. The majority of our membership came mainly from within the Shire of Nillumbik but, to access our courses, a few came from as far afield as Healesville, Kinglake, Mill Park, Greensborough and Watsonia.

Due to illness and burnout I stepped down from the presidency at the AGM in April 2011 and Doug Rutherford, our vice –president, took over. By that time we had a vibrant, active U3A which, to my mind, has provided a very solid basis for the continuing growth and development of U3A Nillumbik.

Tutor Profile Rob Rankin

My love affair with Japanese language and culture began in 1992 when I travelled as chaperone for my daughter who

had recently completed a year's stay in Matsuyama as an exchange student. After five weeks of Japanese hospitality and exploration I found myself fascinated by the feudal history, unfamiliar customs and exciting culinary opportunities. Learning how other people think and see the world is now very important in our global village.

During the next seven years my family provided short term hosting for many Japanese students who were completing English courses at Melbourne or La Trobe universities. Interaction with those young people helped me understand the difficulties they faced learning our language. The first of those students is now married and living with her family in Eltham!

I began part-time study of Japanese in 1998 when the Education Department

provided support teachers willing to learn and teach a second language. In 2001 I was offered a position as a LOTE (Languages Other Than English) teacher. I enjoyed the next seven years sharing enthusiasm for Japanese language and culture with all children in the school — from Prep to Grade 6.

It has been my great pleasure to lead this U3A class during the past

three years. Attendance has varied over that time but small classes of three to six meant we could function well in the home environment venue.

A feature of this class is the online component utilising a program called Moodle which enables me to set class work for the members and they can, in turn, submit homework tasks for sharing and assessment. The bi-lingual features of the program facilitates delivery of class material and interaction between members in both Japanese and English. The written components of the course can be exchanged in all three writing systems – kanji, hiragana and katakana, while romaji is used to introduce new vocabulary and promote conversation.

The class has enjoyed visits from Japanese friends and family members who were able to expand our knowledge, facilitate conversation and explain some of the nuances which are not explained in text books.

Many of the members have travelled to Japan and reported joyful experiences and shown great enthusiasm for further study.

New members are always welcome.

totalitarian State in his novel 1984 where each of its citizens were evaluated watched, necessary, 'controlled'. To many of seems the information collected by agencies within our society fulfil the 'watching' brief of Brother. And then Government tells us to complete our Census 'on-line'! Technology. Arcane magic.

Listening to the media I gained the impression distinct many questioned the entire process. Is it trustworthy? How safe is our personal information? How much of our personal information should we provide? Why is it we are being 'forced' to use technology to fill in these forms? And there were a myriad of other uncertainties raised.

The impact of technology on our society over the last decade has been incredible. Who amongst us doesn't own a mobile phone and a computer? Very few. And connection to the internet has become the norm. Times change. Systems change. Ask yourself how many letters you send via Australia Post? Do you want to send letter when you can use email, message apps, video communication apps, etc? Yes, times change.

And yet the information provided by the Census can be invaluable. It helps to tell us not only who we are but what we want and what we need. Does that affect us here in Eltham? It certainly does. Consider these few 'observations' from the 2011 Census:

In the 2011 census the population of Eltham was 18,162 and is comprised of approximately 51.4% females and 48.6% males.

The median/average age of the people in Eltham is 39 years of age.

80.8% of people living in the suburb of Eltham were born in Australia. The other top responses for country of birth were 5.1% England, 1.1% New Zealand, 0.9% Italy, 0.6% Scotland, 0.6% Germany, 0.5% South Africa, 0.4% United States of America, 0.4% Malaysia, 0.4% Netherlands, 0.4% India, 0.3% China, 0.3% Ireland, 0.3% Greece, 0.2% Canada.

89.3% of people living in Eltham speak English only. The other top languages spoken are 2.7% Language spoken at home not stated, 1.6% Italian, 0.9% Other, 0.9% Greek, 0.5% German, 0.5% Mandarin, 0.4% Macedonian, 0.3% French, 0.2% Dutch.

What does this tell us? Well it tells me Eltham is populated by mainly white Anglo Saxon people with very few of us speaking a second language. I will look with interest at the results from our current census because I feel sure the numbers have changed.

Apart from the Big Brother aspect, I am raising this point because it seems our membership is interested in the language and culture of other societies. Of the 46 classes running this term about 26% focus on languages and cultures other than English. We offer eight language classes (four French, two Spanish, one Italian and one Japanese) and four classes, such as meditation, centred on activities developed outside the English speaking world. Clearly we are interested in the wider world and what we can learn about, and from, it. I would like to think that with this exploration of our ideas we are developing a more inclusive and tolerant society.

And then you stop, think, and realise we are talking about the explosion of technology across our lives. No longer do we live in isolation. The premises outlined in Geoffrey Blainey's *Tyranny of Distance* largely do not exist in our society. The world is fast becoming, as one of my colleagues likes to describe it, a global village. We may all be different but we inhabit the same planet. The politics of hate and fear need to disappear. Such change is never smooth, but it seems to me our U3A is helping it happen within our small part of the world jigsaw.

So Big Brother may be watching but perhaps we can convince him to spend his day smiling.

Tracking David Addley

"In the six years I spent tracking David Addley, it never occurred to me that he didn't exist."

I say this knowing that my words are unheard but I need to get them out, to vent my anger, to publicise my loss.

The thought that I should have questioned your story years ago, that I should have considered its validity rings in my head but I think I'd wanted it to be true, wanted David Addley to be real.

So for six long years I had researched your 'truth' always believing that David was the lost link, that he could explain so much, could free me of my clouded and oppressive past. My goal hadn't been to question his existence but to prove it.

Now I sit in this small room with the little window, the single bed and the frugal furniture and reflect on today's unimaginable revelation. The smell of disinfectant is unable to mask yesterday's cabbage and even the colour and heavy perfume of a vase of late Winter's jonquils struggle to sweeten the air.

For six years you kept your silence and now, late Winter, in

the winter of your years you broke it, your silence, like breaking the cup that brimmed with my anger, my fears and frustrations and, most importantly, my hopes. I rage within, watch silently without.

"It's not true, none of it is, never was." Just moments before you'd said it in a tiny voice, frail and cracked and hopelessly sad. Words that cut through the routine of my visit like fire in ice.

You spoke as you stared out at a willow weeping. Your back was askew and your pale eyes never strayed from the tree's motion while your wrinkled hands played upon silent imagined keys on the windowledge.

We listen to your soundless piano. I watch as you play Black Magic, note perfect, yet again. I think you know exactly where I'm sitting, what your words mean to me but you never turn.

Those words were your first coherent sounds in months, your first spoken communication. Why now, why that? Why should I believe you?

I know exactly the sense behind the words – the denial of a whole chapter in our lives. That story of my mother's betrayal and the existence of my bastard brother, the brother I so desperately want to know is now disputed, challenged by you, a man rapidly disappearing into the sea of his wasting brain. That was your story and now you say it's not true!

I'd hunted for David for so long, had haunted libraries, records and titles offices, become an expert in the use of online searches. I'd read more old newspapers than was polite and even learned the ins and outs of that cumbersome form of record keeping; microfiche. I'd hunted down addresses and knocked on doors and for what - to find my brother, or his memory. To make him real. Today I told you I thought was making progress. Now, once again, you seek to destroy my future.

Through the window I see tiny leaf-spears have emerged along the willow's arms in readiness for the new season, they're poised to burst with energy into Spring. Wordlessly we follow the tree's slow dance.

Now, you have retreated into your empty prison while I at least have choices; to believe there really is a David Addley or not, to continue the search, or not.
